

Family and Intergenerational Faith Formation Survey: Catholic Parish Family Faith Formation Profiles

Prepared by Paulette Chapman and Joan Weber

In the Spring of 2023, NCCL conducted a national survey to identify how well Catholic parishes are implementing practices of family faith formation and intergenerational (all ages together) faith formation. A total of **303** Catholic parishes completed the survey. The first report presented the results of the survey findings. The second phase of the research involved follow-up with survey respondents to develop profiles of family faith formation in their parishes. The "Profiles" report presents the parish profiles organized into the following categories

- 1. Family Catechesis as the Primary Model for Parish Catechesis
 - (Usually designed for families with children through middle school young people; and offered monthly, twice monthly, or weekly)
- 2. Family Catechesis within an Intergenerational Model of Catechesis
- 3. Family Catechesis Integrated within Children's Catechesis, including Sacramental Preparation
- 4. Seasonal Family Catechesis Gatherings

Most parishes that conduct family catechesis utilize a learning process with five elements. There are lots of adaptations of this learning process, but the basic flow can be found in most parish models of family catechesis:

- 1. A shared meal
- 2. A shared prayer experience with all the families
- 3. A whole family learning experience on the topic of the program with content and methods appropriate to an all-ages audience
- 4. In-depth learning experience conducted in one of three ways:
 - Option 1. Whole family learning together with activities appropriate to all ages
 - Option 2. Parallel learning with learning activities for age groups and parents
 - Option 3. Learning activity centers with whole family and age-specific learning
- 5. A closing whole family activity to discover how to apply their learning to daily life using resources and activities provided in print or digital formats.

Description of the Program

Family Formation at All Saints takes a family-focused, thematic-activity approach where groups of families meet monthly to encounter the Lord together and to encourage each other to live as the Domestic Church in and through their home and family life.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

Last year the parish focused on the Holy Bible by introducing families to the Bible, its structure and how to read the Bible, using the *Catholic Children's Bible* from St. Mary's Press. They also followed the liturgical year for some meetings when appropriate. Each month families were given suggested readings and extra tools to help them understand Sacred Scripture. Topics covered included:

- The History of the Kingdom of God
- The Holy Bible and the books that comprise it: Types of books found in the Bible; the senses of Scripture
- Prophets: How to read, key prophets, and selected readings
- Kingdom Parables: How to read and selected parables
- Geography of Israel: Regions and cities of Israel, particularly the city of Jerusalem during Holy Week.
- The Liturgical Year: Structure and key celebrations of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost through experiential prayer services

This year there will be two to three sessions on How to Read the Bible, Family Prayer, and other relevant topics.

Frequency of Programming

Families meet monthly and are provided with at-home materials between the gathered sessions.

Timing

Families meet once a month on Wednesdays from 5:30-6:30.

Description of the Program

We currently have 2 tracks - young families and teens/adults. We use a schedule similar to college semesters: summer (July and August), fall (September - December) and spring (January - June). This coincides with our fiscal year that begins on July 1st. Prior to COVID, we were using the GOF monthly intergenerational session model. This newer method came out of having to go virtual at the beginning of COVID.

Young families meet approximately once a month for a session for our fall and spring semesters. We have a learning session that is followed up a week or two later with a Family Night. For family night, the families share their projects from the options that were given at our last session. We also had a mini-retreat for families during Lent and will add another retreat for Advent for the upcoming year. Family projects also have the option of a service project.

Adults and teens choose from a variety of sessions throughout each semester.

We also have a summer season that will have a family project. Last summer each family read a book and looked for characters that demonstrated gifts of the Holy Spirit. We shared these at the end of the summer. There were a few course options for adults and teens during the summer.

We also added a mini family retreat for Lent. We will continue to have a family friendly retreat for Advent and Lent.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

We use the liturgical year as a guide for our sessions for Church Life (younger families). For our teens and adults there is usually an overriding theme along with other sessions throughout the year. This past year our theme was *Lumen Gentium* and Vatican II. We also had a bible study, scripture discussion on the upcoming weekends readings, Black Catholic History month etc. (I will attach my last 2 years schedules.)

Frequency of Programming

Church Life is approximately once a month
Simply Scripture is approximately six times per semester
We also have one time only course options throughout the semesters.
This past year we also had book groups for Advent and Lent.

Timing (days, times)

Church Life is offered on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. Sunday and Tuesday are virtual. Monday is in person. (Our younger families still prefer the virtual option. The conversations and discussions that the families are having are much better than when we met in person.) Family Night will have two options and are virtual since they are short gatherings to show and tell about their projects.

Most options for teens and adults have at least two options, including a daytime option for seniors.

Teen families began to prefer to meet in person when those options became available after covid. They do like the flexibility of a virtual option if the weather is bad or to make up a session if needed.

Simply Scripture is keeping the virtual option since we have a group that meets fairly consistently, and this group likes to meet virtually.

Description of the Program

The parish's Family Faith Program is for families registered in the parish with children in grades 1 to 8. The program is designed to be a learning experience for both children and their parents (and sometimes grandparents)! Parish leaders recognize the calling and responsibility of parents as primary educators and role models to their children. The FFF program is here to assist parents in passing on our faith to their children. Every family is a mini-church – a domestic church. And as a parish and the Church, the parish is a family of families. The Catechism states that "The Christian home is the place where children receive the first proclamation of the faith. For this reason the family home is rightly called 'the domestic church,' a community of grace and prayer, a school of human virtues and of Christian charity."

The mission of Church of the Presentation's faith formation is to communicate the treasures of faith to its young friends (grades 1 to 8) and to their parents. Using the Emmaus model, the parish walks with its families on a journey towards encountering Jesus in breaking open the Word (online lessons), breaking bread with the whole parish (family Mass), sharing the Good News with others in the spirit of fellowship (building community), and bringing the faith to others through acts of mission and service (act out).

Through Family Faith Formation, Church of the Presentation aims to engage children and their families to be active learners and evangelizers of our faith.

The program consists of two main parts: online weekly lessons and monthly family learning sessions. These are attended by parents, grandparents (sometimes), and children.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

Based on the Lectionary, the curriculum focuses on the Year of the Fish, Year of the Light, and Year of the Fish. (See the separate file for more information.)

Frequency of Programming

There are weekly online lessons, with bi-weekly online lessons for grades 7 and 8. In addition, there are monthly family gatherings/learning sessions as well as social and spiritual events and parish-wide liturgical experiences.

Timing

Families choose from Tuesday or Friday from 6:00-7:30 p.m. or Saturday from 3:00-4:30 one week a month.

Description of the Program

Participants meet two to three times a month as a community. All start together and end together as a group. On the first and second Sundays of the month, parents and children participate in age-appropriate breakout formation sessions (children go to age-appropriate classrooms, adults stay together for adult formation). On the third Sunday of the month, parents and children participate in a service project together focused on a corporal work of mercy. These are known as the parish's Mercy Sundays. Faith formation leaders have patterned with both Peace & Social Justice ministries within the parish as well as organizations outside the parish to complete Service Projects. Past service projects include: stuffing stockings with toiletries for a low-income senior living facility; making suncatchers for sick and homebound parishioners; making "Everything but the Turkey Boxes" for the local food pantry; harvesting and mulching in the parish's Food Justice Garden; and making ABC blocks for a local homeless shelter for pregnant women and new mothers.

Families also receive Weekly Home Lessons that keep the conversations that began at the parish during Family Formation sessions going through the rest of the week.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

- 2023-2024: The Sacraments (The Mass, Baptism, Confirmation, Vocations, Sacraments of Healing, The Creed, Mary)
- 2022-2023: The Liturgical Year, The Saints, Nativity & Incarnation, True Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, Evangelization, Stations of the Cross, God the Father
- 2021-2022: The Bible, The Final Coming, God's Promises (Prophecies), Salesian Spirituality (the parish is staffed by OSFS), Apostolic Succession, Sacrament of Reconciliation, O Most Holy Week

This cycle repeats every three years, so that children receive it once at the primary level and once at the intermediate level.

Frequency of Programming

Families gather two to three times a month.

Timing

Families gather on Sunday mornings between the 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. liturgies. Family Formation takes place from 9:45 to 11:15 a.m., allowing families to attend either of the Sunday masses.

Description of the Program

Faith formation at Most Holy Trinity focuses on each family's and each person's relationship with Jesus and his powerful effect on their lives. Moving more intentionally toward Christ and the faith community is the goal. The emphasis is on lifelong faith formation and the key role parents play in their children's faith. Faith formation offers the support and resources parents need to share faith in Jesus effectively.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

In Year 1, we focused on the Church Year. Year 2 will focus on the Sacraments and Prayer, with a special tie to the Eucharistic Revival.

Frequency of Programming

Families meet the first week of every month. Children meet the third week of every month. In the second and fourth weeks, families are encouraged to use the online at-home resources found on the parish website.

Timing (days, times)

The choices families are Sunday following the 9:00 a.m. Mass, Monday from 6:00-8:00 p.m., or Thursday from 6:00-8:00 p.m. (Spanish/Bilingual).

Description of the Program

Families Forming Disciples is a hybrid, family-focused, thematic-activity approach where groups of families meet with catechists (in-person or virtually) to encounter the Lord together and to encourage each other to live as the Domestic Church in and through their home and family life.

The Office of Evangelization and Discipleship of the Archdiocese of Atlanta offers *Families Forming Disciples* as a specific way to assist parish catechetical leaders, catechists, and parents/families by seeking to engage families in renewed ways, to advance family evangelization and faith formation.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

Year 1 = Building the domestic Church

Year 2 = What's the Story? God's Word & Our Response (sacred history)

Year 3 = What's the Story? God's Word & Our Response Part II the New Testament

Year 4 = The sacraments

Year 5 = TBA

Frequency of Programming

Families meet monthly as a big group for formation for Week 1. In Week 2, families do a mission/activity at home from the lesson plan provided. Week 3 has small community groups meeting off-campus in homes or parks. The lesson plan is on the website for these meetings. Families are invited to build community. Each month the parish has Formation, Mission, and Community time together.

Timing (days, times)

Description of the Program

The parishes of St. Agnes and St. Camillus use an entirely family-based model of Faith Formation. Families have at-home family meetings as well as monthly at-church gatherings. The Faith Formation process begins with an annual parent visit in which the Director of Faith Formation gets to know the families and their needs and how the parish can best serve their family.

The Faith Formation pathway looks a bit different for each family depending on their needs and where they are in their formation pathway. This is not a "one size fits all" program. The parishes put their emphasis on accompaniment and relationships with their families. They also emphasize readiness to celebrate sacraments versus "getting" a sacrament because of being in a certain grade.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

The first year that a family joins the Progressive Faith Formation program, the parishes use two resources from Faith and Family Life Catholic Ministries (FFLCM) - Seek and Root. Seek is a four-session kerygmatic experience, and Root includes six at-home, six at-church, and six parent mini-series based on the Creed. This is for any family new to the program, whether they are seeking sacraments or not.

After the first year, the family will either move into either Sacramental Prep or Ongoing Faith Formation. For Sacramental Prep for Reconciliation and the Eucharist, the program used is *Blessed* by Dynamic Catholic. The family completes the prep entirely at home and the family meets with the Director of Faith Formation to request the sacrament and show readiness. (The parishes will probably transition to *Mend* and *Nourish* for these sacraments in the next couple of years. They are from FFLCM as well.)

Sacramental Prep for Confirmation families uses *Zeal* from FFLCM. There are two tracks, one for young people in grades 6-9 and another for young people in grades 9-12. Both use *Zeal*, one the family box and one the teen version. Young people preparing to celebrate Confirmation will also meet with the Director of Faith Formation before beginning *Zeal* and before entering Immediate Prep. Immediate Prep uses *Never Alone*, a four-part series which can be found on www.formed.org.

For ongoing Faith Formation (families not in Sacramental Prep), other programs from FFLCM are used. This fall, the parishes will begin the *Year of Wonder*, which is about the parables. After the *Year of Wonder*, we will move to *Quest*, which is about prayer. They intend to continue with FFLCM resources for ongoing formation as they are written.

Frequency of Programming

Families gather monthly, with a few exceptions. Seek is done over two months instead of four so it occurs twice monthly. Intergenerational gatherings are extra, with events for Advent, Lent, Easter, and Summer Ordinary Time. With the exception of Seek, families have at least one at-home family meeting each month as well.

Families in Ongoing Formation gather monthly, some months with all families in the ongoing program and some months with their Village (small group of families).

Timing (days, times)

Faith formation happens on Sunday mornings. Families have two options, one at each parish, between the Sunday morning Masses. *Zeal* for teens is on Sunday evening.

Description of the Program

A Family of Faith seeks to strengthen families as children learn the joys of following Jesus and the truths of the Catholic Faith through the witness given by their parents/guardians. Through monthly gatherings and print materials, parents/guardians receive everything they need to explore and to share the Catholic Faith at home. The goals of the A Family of Faith program are 1) to encourage and equip parents/guardians to fulfill their Godgiven duty and privilege of educating their children in the Faith; 2) to support and nurture strong Catholic families who image the Blessed Trinity; 3) to provide parents/guardians the opportunity for continued growth in the Faith; 4) to build community and celebrate Catholic life together.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

St. Ambrose follows a Four-Year Cycle:

Year 1: Profession of Faith (Creed)

Year II: Sacraments Year III: The Life in Christ Year IV: Christian Prayer

Frequency of Programming

Families gather monthly in the parish, with additional seasonal gatherings for Advent, Lent, and the End-of-Year session.

Timing

Family Gatherings are held on Sunday morning from 9:40 to 11:00. Seasonal Gatherings occur on Sundays from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Description of the Program

The parish is in its second year of family formation. All children and families attend Family Faith Formation sessions called Hui 'Ohana (family meeting) two Sundays a month, between the Masses. All parishioners are also invited. On alternating Sundays, parents and children involved in sacramental preparation meet at church. Parents use *A Family of Faith* to catechize their children on their own schedule.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

2023-24 - The Sacraments

Frequency of Programming

Families meet twice a month in person. Parents are provided a parent lesson video at the beginning of the month with information to support their efforts catechizing their children at home during the month.

Description of the Program

St. Cecilia's intergenerational faith formation follows a Whole Community Worship (WCW) model. This involves families attending together, along with adults without children. The format includes a potluck meal, sharing in prayer and fellowship, followed by the session. There are three sessions each month. During two of the sessions, the parish breaks into small groups for faith formation classes. Once a month participants take part in a large-group activity in which families stay together. This may include a prayer experience, a service project, or a community-building activity.

Confirmation meets every other year led by volunteer coordinators. Parents attend with the students and follow the same format as above. Baptism and Marriage prep are individually designed (it's a small parish). For sacramental prep, parents and children come together.

On Sunday morning, the parish offers Catechesis of the Good Shepherd for children in Pre-K through 1st grade. The Liturgy of the Word for Children is also offered.

Adult and youth forums meet periodically, and small groups meet seasonally.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

All topics are based on Fashioning Faith and planned annually.



Yearly Curriculum or Topics

Yearly topics covered include: Creed, Sacraments, Morality, Prayer, Covenants, Discipleship, Justice, Virtues (Living with Holy Habits), Life of Christ, the Bible, and the Liturgical Year.

Frequency of Programming

The intergenerational sessions are held on a monthly basis.

Timing

This has changed in the last several years. Currently the sessions are held on Saturday mornings from 9:15 to 10:45; Sunday mornings beginning with Mass at 10:00 with the sessions following until 12:30 p.m.; and Monday evenings from 6:15 to 7:45 p.m.

Description of the Program

There is a family session once a month in place of a "classroom" session. The sessions are thematic, self-paced, and facilitated by the classroom catechists. Each month five to seven learning centers are set up throughout the gym, and families move at their own pace, visiting as many learning centers as time allows. There is a yearly theme. Hospitality is part of the family sessions, and priority is placed on families attending the family session vs. the classroom. All parishioners are welcome, and frequently grandparents come with their families or bring the children whose parents work on the weekends.

The second-grade sacramental preparation is done entirely by parents. They are prepared via four adult sessions, then do the faith formation at home with their child.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

Previous themes included unpacking the beatitudes, one beatitude each month; unpacking the sacraments, one each month. The parish uses a lectionary-based curriculum.

Frequency of Programming

Families gather once a month with a few extra seasonal sessions added (e.g., Advent Wreath-Making). Classroom sessions occur twice monthly.

Timing

Sessions happen between the two Sunday morning Masses for 90 minutes.

Description of the Program

Before COVID, the parish had a traditional weekly classroom-based program for school-age children. Just before COVID hit, parish leaders had come to a decision to transition from a traditional weekly classroom model to a family-based program.

In December of 2019 St. Alphonsus began offering Children's Liturgy of the Word at one Mass a week for children ages 3-7. This was received well but was shut down with COVID just a few months later. CLOW resumed in the Spring of 2021.

Currently, the parish has completed two years of in-person Family Formation, using the Family Formation program from the Church of St. Paul. This program has one in-person meeting a month and three to four home lessons each month. At the in-person meeting, the parish begins with social time. The children are then sent to classrooms with catechists while parents have a guest speaker (a volunteer from the parish or the DRE) who speaks about the theme of that month to the parents. There are also icebreakers and discussion time for parents to try to build some community.

In the 2021-22 year the parish used Signs of Grace for Sacramental Prep as an at-home program (using the online platform) with families still attending Family Formation. They also had an in-person retreat for each sacrament. For the 2022-23 year the parish is going with the Family Formation Sacramental Prep. This was also well-received and worked better for keeping families together on same schedule.

For 2021-22 the parish included grades 7 and 8 with the high schoolers and called this weekly in-person meeting Youth Ministry. Grades 7-9 used Year 1 of EQSaints Equipped for Life. Grades 10-12, preparing for Confirmation, used Chosen from Ascension Press. Grades 7-8 were in one group and grade 9 in another group, both using Year 1. One post-Confirmation youth from the previous year wanted to continue coming to Wednesday nights, so she became a helper in the grade 7-8 group.

For the 2022-23 year the parish had 7th grade doing Year 1, grades 8-9 doing Year 2, and grades 10-12 doing Chosen. The Confirmation Prep catechists utilized Kahoot to pre-test the youth on the different Chosen chapters. For 2023-24 the parish is breaking up grades 7, 8, and 9 and using Years 1, 2, and 3 (soon to be released) from EQSaints. They will continue using Chosen for Confirmation Prep.

In the summer a Totus Tuus team from the Diocese puts on a day program for grades 1-6 and an evening program for grades 7-12. This lasts for one week.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

CLOW is based on the children's lectionary and meets weekly from October to May. Family Formation is based on the Family Formation curriculum. For the 2022-23 year the theme was the Liturgical Year. For the 2023-24 year the theme is The Mass. A list of topics for the current year can be found here:

EQSaints Equipped for Life has a different theme for each year. Year 1 is called Encounter and is used for the 7th graders. Encounter is focused on introducing young people to Christian Life. They look at faith and doubt, our relationship with God the Father, and who Jesus Christ was and is in our lives. Year 2 for Grade 8 is called Discipleship and is about developing the foundational habits of Christian life, from the establishment of

personal prayer time to the teachings of the Church, to worship, and community. Year 3, Mission, for the 9th graders is about becoming an ambassador of Christ and taking up the ministry of the Church. The 10th through 12th graders preparing for Confirmation experience Chosen from Ascension Press. Totus Tuus program is provided by the Diocese

Frequency of Programming

CLOW meets weekly from October to May. Family Formation meets monthly from September to May. Youth Ministry meets weekly from September to May.

Timing

CLOW has been meeting at the 9:00 a.m. Sunday Mass. Family Formation meets the first Sunday of the month after the 9:00 Sunday Mass year. Youth Ministry meets weekly from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. Totus Tuus meets for one week in the summer. Description of the Program

The Cathedral offers a hybrid of class instruction for grades 1-12 and a parent class. Sacramental prep includes First Communion for grades 2+ (the majority of our First Communicants were 3-8th grade) and a two-year Confirmation program. Faith formation alternates with Family Faith encounters: adoration, family reconciliation, rosary, divine mercy chaplet, church tour, prayer stations, ask a priest, stations of the cross, etc. Service projects are also part of faith formation. In 2022-23, there were 18 traditional class weekends, 14 family faith encounter weekends, two sacramental weekends and a year-end celebration.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

the program is evolving. The Cathedral transitioned from an older version of *Be My Disciples* to a *Word of Life* series for the 2022-23 faith formation year and is now evaluating alternatives. Loyola Press is utilized for Confirmation.

Families are made up of people speaking nine different languages. Topics for parent class were driven in part by parent feedback at the beginning of the school year. The parent class content follows church seasons, and this year time was spent on the catechism. While the parents are not following the same content as the students, parents are made aware of what topics are being covered with the students.

The theme or focus for this past year was prayer. In 2023-24, it will be the universal call to holiness with a focus on the saints.

Frequency of Programming

Faith formation happens weekly from September through May.

Timing

Sessions are offered on Sunday mornings between 8:30 and 11:00 a.m. Masses.

The parish, acting on the belief that parents are the primary teachers of their children in the faith, offers inperson classes for students in Pre-School through Grade 8 while supporting and accompanying the parents. Children's classes meet weekly for one hour from September through April. Families gather throughout the year with their children to experience intergenerational learning. The intergenerational family sessions focus on a specific theme each year.

A home study program is provided for students whose families cannot attend the weekly program.

Description of the Program

Children attend classes weekly, and parents come once a month for a catechetical session on a particular topic. The parish used Pflaum *Gospel Weeklies* for the curriculum in 2022-2023. For the 2023-2024 year, the parish is using Loyola Press' *Finding God* series, utilizing the Family Catechesis model.

Sacramental preparation is completed on-site in family groups, with catechist-facilitated, parent-led sessions.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

The Loyola Press curriculum is divided into five units: God the Father; Jesus Our Lord and Savior; The Church, Our Community in the Spirit; Sacraments, Our Way of Life; and Morality, Our Lived Faith. There are also seasonal sessions for Advent/Christmas and Lent/Easter, as well as sessions for the Liturgical Year and Saints.

The parish is also offering sessions for parents on topics related to parenting and family life.

Frequency of Programming

Last year the parish had weekly sessions, but experienced significant attrition after Christmas. This year the parish made the decision to meet twice per month (even though the Family Catechesis Model only calls for once a month).

Timing

The sessions take place on Sunday mornings between the two later Masses (9:00 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.). Sacramental preparation meets weekly on Thursday evenings from 6:30-7:30 p.m.

St. Michael's utilizes a flexible hybrid program including:

- Family-chosen prayer and service

Class or home study lessons are lectionary-based and use Pflaum's *Gospel Weeklies*. Each week the Sunday Gospel is studied and applied to the family's lives.

Faith Formation at Holy Name of Mary parish fosters a life-long journey of discipleship for the whole family. Our primary mission is encounters with Christ for children, teens, and their parents.

Yearly Curriculum or Topics

The parish incorporates a three-part model: my child's faith, my family's faith, and my faith. The curriculum has varied from year to year after this model was first adopted during the pandemic (2020-21). For children, the parish uses a basal curriculum program (Year 1), sacrament curriculum (Year 2), and then other youth groups after the sacramental journey. For families, the parish offers various whole family events during the year on topics such as the liturgical year, a Scripture/Sacrament retreat (Year 2), a kerygma retreat (Year 1), saints, and Mary. The parents are offered various one-day programs or series such as Gospel reflection groups, a parent retreat, and book study groups.

Frequency of Programming

Children meet two times per month. Families have three events per year but are welcome to attend more. Parents have one event or series per year. Again, they are welcome to attend more sessions.

Timing

Children meet on weekday afternoons or evenings. Families gather on an evening or on Saturday. Parents attend during their children's classes or on evenings or Saturdays.
